

THE LOS ANGELES SUPERIOR COURT IS OFFERING UNLAWFUL DETAINER MANDATORY SETTLEMENT CONFERENCE TRAINING

The Los Angeles Superior Court is developing a pilot program for new and current Temporary Judges to provide mandatory settlement conferences on the day of trial in unlawful detainer actions in the Stanley Mosk Courthouse. Training for the program is as follows:

Requirements for **new** Temporary Judges for this program:

1. Member in good standing of the State Bar of California for ten years.
2. Submit applications to serve as a Temporary Judge and application to serve as a Temporary Judge for the UD MSC program by August 16, 2019. The applications may be obtained in fillable form at: <http://www.lacourt.org>.
3. Live Unlawful Detainer Mandatory Settlement Conference Training. (October 21, 2019)
4. Live Bench Conduct and Demeanor Training. (upcoming training on September 10, 2019)
5. Three hours of online training in Judicial Ethics for Temporary Judges.
6. Online substantive Unlawful Detainer Training.

Requirements for current Temporary Judges for this program:

1. Submit application to serve as a Temporary Judge for the UD MSC program by August 16, 2019.
2. Live Unlawful Detainer Mandatory Settlement Conference Training. (October 21, 2019)
3. Online substantive Unlawful Detainer Training.
